

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The "Art of Resistance" project, spanning three years, documented over a century of protest movements in Bristol.

The project celebrated the vital role of creativity in activism, through an array of activities, including interviews, workshops, performances, film screenings, and exhibitions.

While originally intended for completion in 2022, the project faced a delay in practical implementation due to COVID-19 lockdown and restrictions. Nonetheless, the full project has been delivered which has left a lasting legacy that continues to evolve thematically across Trinity's creative and cultural programming.

Project outputs created as part of the project include a book, films, a podcast series, as well as an interactive digital archive that will ensure unheard stories are retained for current and future generations.

We give special thanks and acknowledgement to the Heritage Lottery Fund for giving us the tools to uncover the rich research behind this project, volunteers and participants for their generosity.



ART OF RESISTANCE: AIM

'Art of Resistance' aimed to uncover the role of art and activism through the lived experiences of inner-city Bristolians. The project focused on the rich histories of five key activist movements from the last 100yrs: Women's Equality, Workers Rights, Anti-Racism & Anti-Fascism, Counterculture & Reclaim the Environment.

Through collecting oral histories and retaining mixed art forms (e.g. poetry, textiles, banners, music, photography) from protest movements we wanted to celebrate the rich heritage of Bristol, and its citizens, as a 'city of protest' to educate, inspire and retain this rich history for ours and future generations.



RESEARCH TRAINING PROGRAMME


We created opportunities that enabled first-step engagement with heritage - providing space for people to explore their heritage and learn new skills in research.

In response to Covid-19 lockdown restrictions, we created a free-to-access online course to learn heritage research skills. We employed researchers including Dr Madge Dresser and DM Withers, to deliver sessions covering research and documentation skills, specifically how to transform these into heritage stories.

When restrictions allowed, we toured archival centres in Bristol including M-Shed, Bristol Central Library, Bristol Record Office.

Throughout the project volunteers supported the delivery of the project, helping us discover stories, images and artefacts.

83 volunteers took part in **69** hours of training delivered by **11** professionals.



GUIDED WALKS


We explored the hidden history of Bristol's protest movements through 'Rebel Walks'

Chris Chalkley, founder of PRSC, led a walk exploring the inner-city suburb of Stokes Croft and its complex story of citizen-solutions to social problems through exploring.

Writer and historian Mike Manson led a walk sharing the story of the 1932 Old Market Riot where a protest led by the Unemployed Workers Union was attacked by the police. He later covered the Bristol Bridge massacre of 1793.

Community activist Simbarashe Tongogara shared his firsthand experience of the 1980's Stoke Croft Riots and the social and economic factors leading up to them.

91 people took part in **4** 'Rebel Walks' and **10** professionals were employed



SHARING EVENTS

We preserved local testimonies of activism across generations through 'I Remember When'.

'I Remember When' was a series of focus groups to share and collect personal stories from Womens Rights, Anti Racism and Environmental movements.

During these sessions we collected memories and artefacts that contributed to our end of project exhibition, book publication and online archive.

Participants included Laura Corballis, Deasy Bamford, Gill Haugh, Ros Beauhill, Lilieth Morrison and Colin Moody.

PROGRAMMED ACTIVITY

We explored and celebrated the rich history of art and activism in Bristol through a series of accessible heritage events.

Our programme of activity spanned talks, exhibitions and events for people of all ages and backgrounds to engage with, connect through and be inspired by stories of our shared past.

We programmed 'The Final Frontier' a creative conference of artists and activists and commentators. We also hosted pioneering artist Lowkey for an 'In Conversation' event. Connecting with our live-music programme, we welcomed Soundsystem pioneers DJ Stryda, Lioness, Big D and Vibronics for a 'Desert Island Discs' style event in our outdoor venue.

We curated three exhibitions' exploring protest through various artforms. 'Snapshots of Resistance' (online & in person) showcased a selection of photographs documenting women protestors & pioneering artists. 'The Final Frontier' exhibition featured Jamie Gilman's famous Ursula bear and 'After the Fire' - an audiovisual odyssey into the sights and sounds of protest action.

IN FOCUS: ARTS ENGAGEMENT

Bristol-based artist Tanith Gould co-created a mural exploring radical history.

Tanith hosted three workshops at Trinity where people were invited to come together to discuss their role and the city's role in social, political and environmental injustice.

Alongside this, attendees explored these themes using mixed-media including collage, paint and printmaking.

Tanith used these as the inspiration for the mural 'Bristol Resists' which was unveiled at our community Garden Party before being featured at the PRSC gallery in Stokes Croft.

IN FOCUS – RUTH

Mother, Activist and PhD student Ruth Nortey took part 'Stories of Resistance' a free podcast making workshop offered as part of Art of Resistance.

In making the podcast, Ruth reflected that she learned a lot - from how to build a story and how to make content interesting to the public. Ruth shared that she was supported to put her ideas together -from running through each process of the podcast to working on the build and design.

Due to her visual impairment, Ruth shared found it quite tricky to edit and know "how to put the different pieces of the podcast together" however, she reflects that she overcame this due to "lots of one-to-one support from the team".

On taking part in the project, Ruth reflected that "as a disabled person, I think it's really important that we have that space where we feel comfortable in coming to, where we can get the additional support that we need, and I felt that I got that support through this project which was great".


IN FOCUS: AFTER THE FIRE

We offered a paid commission for an artist/collective to create a piece of work in response to the archive content

Local artist Iman Sultan West designed 'After The Fire', an immersive exhibition that explored 'the sounds and sights of resistance' by using projection mapping and installation. Iman projected images of activist spaces around Bristol onto the walls, highlighting the unappreciated moments of activism using 'place' and 'image' as a reminder of change and persistence to the cause.

Following this commission, in March 2023, Iman was one of three selected artists invited to exhibit their work as part of Creators in Residence at Rising Arts Agency's exhibition 'BeLoved' at Arnolfini Galley, sharing their radical reimaginings for the world we live in.

Approximately 350 audience members viewed the After The Fire exhibition

IN FOCUS: THE FINAL FRONTIER

In March 2022, we programmed a two-day festival that explored how creative outputs have been integral to protest movements.

We invited contemporary artists and activists who use creativity as a form of protest to take part in keynotes addresses, panel discussions and lead workshops. Guests included environmental activist Mikaela Loach, Bristol 'artists and activists' Doug Francis (Invisible Circus) Chris Chalkley (PRSC) and Michelle Curtis, plus comedian, programmer and tutor Angie Belcher (AfterMirth) whose recent calls for 'comedy on prescription' made headlines, and many, many more.

Additional highlights included a second day exploring reclamation of the body as part of our Women's Rights strand, featuring artist Tamatha Ann Harris, Katie Grant, & dancer/life model Itzel Technicolor with a keynote from Rommi Smith.

The Final Frontier welcomed **110** audience members and **24** artists/activists.



RESEARCH, ARCHIVE AND BOOK

Across the project we explored and documented five areas of activism: Working Class Rights, Anti-Racism & Anti-Fascism Counterculture & Civil Disobedience and Reclaiming the Environment to capture the city's history of grass-roots artistic, community and cultural movements.

We collected **30 oral history testimonies** with creative activists including Mark Cosgrove, Cleo Lake and Rita Lynch. Through a public call-out, Bristol residents submitted photos, banners and posters via our digital platform – capturing the stories of creative activism at a grassroots level.

These stories and artefacts formed the research for our Heritage Book 'Art & Activism' curated and edited by Dr Edson Burton.

Additionally, we created an interactive timeline 'Radicalism' where people can further explore Bristol's rich history of activism and the heritage stories collected as part of the 'Art of Resistance'.



IN FOCUS: ONLINE ARCHIVE

We invested in our digital platforms to document and conserve heritage through our interactive online archive.

The online archive allowed us to upload the oral history and material gathered by the research team to Trinity's website.

The interactive timeline named 'Radicalism' allows users to explore hidden radical histories and first-hand testimonies uncovered by the Art of Resistance project.

Designed using Open-Source CRM Plone, this digital platform has created a solid foundation for future timelines.

Further to this, our development team created a bespoke tool allowing us to export over 10 years of content collected during previous heritage content to the platform, ensuring a continued legacy for all our Heritage Lottery Funded Projects.



IN FOCUS: TELLING UNTOLD STORIES

Dr Edson Burton reflects on the importance of uncovering unheard stories

Diversity does not belong to the 'woke', it is merely a recognition of our past. But what we mean by 'knowledge', 'experts' and 'research' has been diluted to the point of meaninglessness. Identity has once again become a national football, a distraction used by all sides of the political spectrum.

The role of the heritage sector is uniquely vital at this point in time. Either through initiating or co-producing projects with community partners, our sector has the opportunity to spread research skills where it is arguably most needed and most impactful.

Art of Resistance needed to involve lots of Bristol's voices. The People's Republic of Stokes Croft gave unprecedented access to a network of activist artists and audiences – each with their own unique stories. Activist poet Deasy Bamford recounted Bristol's green activism over the past three decades and artist Rosa Truelove helped us to understand the innate creativity of squat culture. All have helped to build up the stories of inner-city Bristolians and the past 100 years of social activism, protest and civil disobedience.
